Mandurah Tree Advocates guest presenter in March was the Shire of Murray's Planning and Environment Manager Leanne McGuirk. City of Mandurah was presented with a suggested list of Western Australian Trees, Shrubs and Companion Plantings for their District which was compiled by Men of The Trees - Peel, the Friends of Samphire Cove Nature Reserve and MTA. The Friends of Rivers Peel are building on the twelve year history of successful clean-ups of waterways guided by Colin Elton. Following the success of the Clean Up Peel Waterways events we, in partnership with the Peel-Harvey Catchment Council, are looking to introduce a Keep Peel Waterways Beautiful concept which will focus on preventing rubbish and litter entering our waterways.

The Friends of Samphire Cove Nature Reserve plant hundreds of seedlings annually with matting and mulch provided by Peel-Harvey Catchment Council. Parks and Wildlife Services manage the reserve and have recently resurfaced the limestone track in preparation for the Friend's suggested All- Abilities Interpretive Trail. On the last Sunday of every month 9-10 members on average turn up to work at the reserve.

The Canoe Trail Friends of Mandurah and Pinjarra are well known for their published canoe guides and brochures, as advocates for canoe launch sites and for the protection of our aquatic fauna. This year they persuaded Mirvac to donate \$7000 to the City of Mandurah for an additional All-terrain Wheelchair while ensuring that the existing one at Mandurah Visitor Centre is available for paddlers and non-paddlers.

Events we participated in this year included National Tree Planting Day, Mandurah Rotary Duck Race, Falcon Lions Club Kids Fishing Competition, Stretch Festival's Environment Event and Yalgorup Bioblitz.

The closure by Sport and Recreation of our seven free websites last month, forced us to have one main website constructed and managed with a big thank you to our hardworking secretary Linda.
