Every month Barry attends Peel Preservation Group meetings and does our Facebook page, updating it frequently. He cross-advertises other local groups' enviro events and happenings there too, with helpful information about wildlife conservation and Australia-wide recycling, renewable energy and sustainability initiatives.

Barry helped to organise the Clean-up Peel Waterways 2019 and this showcased one of Barry's great strengths, which is pulling together various groups for a common cause.
